I've digitized that recording and it's linked on **Grandma's Featured Ancestor page**. (Or, see the FM blog for a direct link.)

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

FamMail Information via Website, Blog, Newsletter (and CD)

I've created a FamMail CD for those of you who have a computer but no access to the Internet.

It contains the same information (website, photos, stories, audio and some video files) as the FamMail website (but not the photo <u>albums</u>, YouTube based videos or the Blog).

I've included brief how-to instructions and website navigation tips. The CD has been tested on six different PC's using XP, Vista and Windows 7 operating systems.

It's just a website on a disk and so should work with any browser and any computer that can read the CD. Unfortunately the CD was out-ofdate the moment it was created because the website is constantly updated via some live links to the Internet (plus our frequent updates and additions).

It is intended to be a "snapshot" of the Website as of 1/1/2012.

I don't anticipate future updates of the CD so this is a one-time way to see what FamMail is all about.

Accessing the website and blog online is the only way to keep up-to-date with the work we are doing.

Note: This is a <u>computer</u> CD (not an audio CD).

The (only) Seat of Education for Decades in Canton

How many of us went to school in this brick building? Built in 1915, many members of our family took classes here including my Dad. This was my school building from 1st grade through 6th. The new (then) grade school was completed in 1958 where I attended 7th and 8th grades. Then back to this building for freshman through the first semester of senior years (through 1963). The new (then) high school was completed just in time for the

second half of my senior year and so my class of 13 was the first to graduate from the "new" high school in 1964.



By the way, we <u>students</u> moved the high school (desks, equipment, materials, etc.) across town (3/4 of a mile?) to the new building.

I remember some of the older boys carrying chemistry supplies, down the main front stairs, in a large cardboard box, when it came apart spilling and combining who knows what chemicals (and prompting a hasty evacuation of the area).

The FamMail Museum


The website will have a special "museum" feature with pages devoted to photos and descriptions of items of interest that belonged to our ancestors or give us a glimpse into history to better understand their times.

Over the years I've acquired books and binders, scribbled hundreds of notes and saved Internet articles and emails. Here are some of the family history references I have:

Family Histories

The Kilmer Family History (1980) by Ralph and Mildred Kilmer, The Andreas Decker Family Record (1959) by Lydia Eck Cooper, the John David Nightengale Family Record by Lillian Nightengale Voth, The Nightengale binder by Aunt Hattie (Nightengale) Unruh, The Holdeman Descendants Vol I (1937) by Edwin Weaver and Vol II (1973) by Ella Holdeman (thank you Uncle Thomas), The Jacob Ratzlaff book (1958) by Marie (Ratzloff) Schneider and Aunt Jean's update of that book, The Bernard Ratzlaff Family Record by Suzanna Unruh, the David S. Holdeman book (1951) by Mr. & Mrs. Obed Johnson and Mr. & Mrs. Orville E. Wiggers, Carolyn Regier's Henry J. and Katherine Ratzloff binder (2001).

Books Containing Family Names

Brothers in Deed to Brothers in Need and The Holdeman People (both by Hiebert), Spring Valley Mennonite Church 1873-1973, The 1963 Histories of the Congregations (Mennonite) and Directory of Civilian Public Service.

Related History Books

The Pennsylvania Dutch (1950) by Fredric Klees, The Coming of the Russian Mennonites (1927) by C. Henry Smith, The Helpless Poles by Abe J. Unruh, Menno Simons' Life and Writings (1936) and in Plautdietsch: a book of stories and poems and a dictionary.

Community books for Canton and Galva, several other unattributed and undated booklets and binders.

Of course, the Internet is filled with pedigree charts, family histories, maps and reference materials far beyond the imagination of pencil and paper genealogists in the past.

"The" John Holdeman

I also have three books by John Holdeman: Spiegel der Wahrheit (1880 (in old German typeface)), A History of the Church of God (1938) and Magistracy and War (1928).

"Johnny" founded the Holdeman branch of the Mennonite Church and is a 1st cousin three times removed to Gordon, Sondra & Connie.

Christian and Christiana's sons, David and Amos were brothers. John A. Holdeman (son of David) and Johnny (son of Amos) were 1st cousins. That makes Katherine (Holdeman) Ratzloff his 1st cousin once removed and Rolan Ratzloff a 1st cousin twice removed and so we are 1st cousins thrice removed.

I'm using the registered version (there is a free version) of Legacy Family Tree 7.5 by Millennia to research, enter and organize information, print charts, timelines, etc.



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I wrote about this photo in a letter to Connie in 2000:

It's Dad standing by one of his old tractors and on the back, in his handwriting, it says: "1936 Model D 1920 Man" I've had the picture for years and years and just recently noticed that bit of humor.

So Dad reached out to me here in May, 2000 and made me smile. Miss him so... GT
